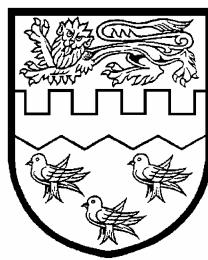

Dear Parents

In September your daughter moves on to Key Stage 4 of the National Curriculum. This covers two years of study in Years 10 and 11, leading to GCSE or other qualifications in the Summer of 2012.

She will study the following compulsory subjects:

English, Maths, Science, RS, ICT, an Arts* Subject (or Triple Science), CPSHE, PE.

Plus:

Three 'Option' subjects.

**Arts Subjects: Art & Design, Dance, Drama, Media Studies, Music, Photography, Textiles*

Our Key Stage 4 curriculum is designed to ensure breadth and balance. It conforms to the National Curriculum, and also reflects our status as a Specialist in Arts & Science.

Your daughter will be able to explore all the possible opportunities and combinations in her CPSHE lessons, when there will be plenty of time for her to ask questions. In addition, please discuss the booklet with your daughter at home so that you have reached a decision by 2 March.

A small number of pupils may be offered a course at Chichester College, or a Diploma course at another school. We will identify these pupils and contact their parents with further information.

Your daughter will be issued with a form on which to record her choices. Please bring the completed form with you on Review Day, Tuesday 2 March, to which you will be invited and when you will have the opportunity to discuss and agree the choices with your daughter's Form Teacher.

THE OPTIONS PROCESS

2010-2012

Key Dates

w/b 8 Feb	This booklet issued to pupils. Parents' Consultation appointment sheets issued. Pupils start to discuss choices with their parents. 'Choices' Forms issued.
Tues 9 Feb	Y9 Science Tests to help Science Department identify possible candidates for Triple Science course.
Wed 24 Feb	Year 9 Parents' Consultation.
Tues 2 Mar	Review Day Y9 pupils & parents meet Form Tutor to finalise choices.
April/May	Choices are processed & timetables created for Y10. If any courses are undersubscribed they will not run and we will need to ask pupils to choose again. This may also happen if a particular combination of subjects proves to be impossible.
May	Pupils chosen for College Courses will be interviewed at Chichester College.
June	Choices finalised.

The National Curriculum at Key Stage 4

Compulsory Subjects

- English, Mathematics, Science ('Core' subjects)
- At least one Arts subject **or** Extra (Triple) Science)
- Citizenship, Personal, Social & Health Education (CPSHE)
- Physical Education
- Religious Studies

Option Subjects

In Years 10 and 11 pupils study a further four subjects of their own choice. At least one of these must be an Arts subject, unless they intend to take Triple Science.

CHSG is a Specialist School in Arts & Science

- **All pupils except those following a Triple Science course must study at least one Arts subject. They should use the white form to make their choices**
- **Arts subjects are: Art & Design, Dance, Drama, Media Studies, Music, Photography, Textiles**
- **The most able Science pupils will automatically follow a Triple Science course. They should use the yellow form to make their choices**
- **Other pupils who show ability in Science at KS3 (at good Level 6 or above) will be offered the opportunity to study Triple Science in place of one of their Option subjects. Their potential in Science will be assessed by their teachers and by a test set in February. They will be separately notified and if they decide to choose Triple Science they should use the pink form to make their choices**
- **Note: pupils studying Triple Science are not required to choose an Arts subject, although they may wish to do so**

Courses at Chichester College

A small number of pupils will be invited to follow a vocational course at Chichester College on one day per week. These pupils will be given a separate booklet and Choices Form giving full details.

The New Diploma

On p41 you will find details of the Diploma which is available in other institutions in the area. The Diploma is not suitable for all pupils and as a school we will identify those for whom a Diploma may be appropriate.

Examinations at Key Stage 4

GCSE (General Certificate of Secondary Education) replaced 'O' levels and CSEs in 1988. Most pupils take GCSEs in most of their subjects at the end of Year 11.

Coursework is part of most GCSEs: work over an extended period, which could include essays, field work reports, art work, making products, or investigations. The work may be done at home or at school, or a combination of both. Coursework is normally assessed by the class teacher. The exam boards moderate standards by sampling.

Grades at GCSE are from A*-G, depending on coursework and exam marks. A*-G are all pass grades, although employers and colleges may expect A*-C grades in, for example, 5 subjects including Maths & English.

Tiers at GCSE determine the range of grades that can be awarded. The aim is for pupils to take an exam in which their ability will be tested, without their being thrown off course by questions that are much too difficult or much too easy.

Mathematics has two tiers: Higher (Grades A*-C) and Foundation (Grades C-G). The most able pupils will be offered the chance to take Additional Maths as well as Mathematics GCSE.

Science has 3 'Pathways' leading either to a double GCSE award (2 Grades) or to 3 separate Grades in Biology, Chemistry & Physics ('Triple Science'). See p10-11 for full details.

English leads to 2 Grades: one for **English** and one for **English Literature**.

Religious Studies is a 'short course' taken by all pupils for one lesson per week, leading to half a GCSE grade.

It is also offered as an Option subject for 3 lessons per week, leading to a full GCSE grade. Pupils choosing this option will also take the short course.

CPSHE (Citizenship, Personal, Social, & Health Education) is taken by all pupils. They will take a CoPE (Certificate of Personal Effectiveness) Award, equivalent to GCSE Grade C (Level 2) or GCSE Grade E (Level 1).

Most pupils at this school take GCSEs in English, English Literature, Mathematics, Science (2 or 3), Religious Studies (½), an Arts subject plus 3 other Option subjects.

MAKING CHOICES

As you choose your subjects try to work out your reasons for picking them.

GOOD REASONS

- I know I can do it and get a good exam result.
- I want it to balance my other subjects and keep my career options open.
- I am interested in this subject and want to know more.
- It will help my understanding of another subject.
- It will be a good starter for a job.
- I came across it in a book or programme and it sounds interesting.
- I think it will broaden my view of the world.

FAIR REASONS

- It seems silly to waste past work on this subject.
- It earned me a good mark in my last exam.
- My parents think I should do it.
- I want to try something new.
- It backs up an out-of-school interest.
- My teacher thinks I should do it.

POOR REASONS

- I cannot think of anything else.
- I like the subject teacher.
- I could not make up my mind so I shut my eyes and used a pin.
- All my friends are choosing it.

Frequently-Asked Questions (FAQs)

Q: I want to go on to Sixth form & possibly University. What should I choose?

A: Universities do look at GCSE results when selecting students, so you should choose subjects that you enjoy and in which you will get the best possible grades. Grades matter more than choice of subjects, although if there is a subject you want to study more than anything at University, you should choose it or a subject like it. If you intend to study a language at A Level you should continue with it at GCSE.

Q: How can I find out about new subjects?

A: From this booklet, from talks in assembly, from older students, and from the Heads of those subjects, who will be pleased to explain.

Q: Will I get all the subjects I choose?

A: We will try to fit everything in for you, but if very few girls choose a subject, it will be cancelled and your reserve choice will be used, or you may be asked to choose again.

Q: Will I be with my friends next year?

A: Even if you take exactly the same subjects as your friends, there is no guarantee you will be in the same group.

ENGLISH / ENGLISH LITERATURE

Syllabus: AQA Specification (3702 / 3712)

Aim

English at Key Stage 4 will result, for most students, in the achievement of 2 GCSE grades – one in English Language, the second in English Literature.

You will have numerous chances to develop your skills in:

Speaking and Listening (including your ability to formulate and express ideas; listen, understand and respond to others; and take part in drama activities.)

Reading (including your abilities to read accurately and fluently; understand, respond to and enjoy literature from English literary heritage and from different cultures and traditions.)

Writing (including use of your skills to develop ideas and communicate meaning in Standard English; organise and structure sentences correctly; and develop essential presentational skills including accurate punctuation, spelling and legible handwriting.)

Content

You will read and explore a wide range of texts including novels, poems, plays, non fiction material and items from the media. You will write in a variety of styles including:

- to explore, imagine and entertain;
- to inform, explain and describe;
- to argue, persuade and advise;
- to analyse, review and comment.

You will also take part in oral activities individually, in pairs and in groups.

Assessment

For English Language you must produce four assessments which will be completed in school under controlled conditions. You will complete a variety of speaking and listening activities which are also assessed in school. There is one external examination which assesses reading and writing skills.

For English Literature you will have to submit a fifth assignment completed under controlled conditions at school. These are two external examinations which assess your understanding of a 'modern text' and 'poetry across time'.

Homework

You will be expected to read set texts, develop your coursework and undertake other related reading and writing tasks. Homework will be set at least once a week.

MATHEMATICS

Syllabus: To be confirmed as per Government changes due to be introduced during 2010

Aim

Maths is fun and challenging!

Maths GCSE will enable you to achieve success in the essential skills of numeracy and problem solving. You will need these skills in other subjects in the curriculum and everyday life.

The course will develop your ability to think and reason mathematically. It will help you realise the application of Maths in the world around you and also help prepare you for further study.

Content

There are two tiers of entry: Foundation (C-G)
 Higher (A*-D)

Our most able students will be given the opportunity to sit the Additional Mathematics course in addition to GCSE Mathematics as preparation for the A Level course.

Students will be expected to bring to every lesson all the normal mathematical equipment and a scientific calculator.

Assessment

This is a 100% exam based course, there is no coursework

The Government is making big changes to the Maths curriculum this year and this will have an influence upon the exact assessment arrangements.

Homework

You will be expected to complete homework tasks of up to 2 hours per week.

“The most enjoyable part of Maths is when you have a difficult problem and you get the right answer.”

SCIENCE

Syllabuses: AQA

Pathway 1a (Triple Award Science)

GCSE Biology, Chemistry, Physics ('Express' triple GCSE award course in 11 lessons per fortnight). All students will complete the higher* examination papers.

Pathway 1b (Triple Award Science)

GCSE Biology, Chemistry, Physics (triple GCSE award course in 11 lessons per week + 5 lessons as an option). Students have to select Science as an option. Students may complete the higher* or foundation* examination papers.

Pathway 2

GCSE Science plus Additional Science (double GCSE award course in 11 lessons per fortnight). Students may complete the higher* or foundation* examination papers.

Pathway 3

GCSE Science plus Additional Applied Science (double GCSE award course in 11 lessons per fortnight)

Aim

The Chichester High School for Girls offers a suite of courses providing pathways designed to cater for the differing needs and abilities of our pupils. All Key Stage 4 science pupils will:

- Learn about the way science and scientists work within society;
- Consider the relationships between data, evidence, theories and explanations;
- Develop their practical, problem-solving and enquiry skills, working individually and in groups;
- Evaluate enquiry methods and conclusions both quantitatively and qualitatively;
- Communicate their ideas with clarity and precision;
- Develop their ability to relate their understanding of science to their own and others' lifestyles, and to scientific and technological developments in society.

Assessment

Pathways 1a 1b: Year 10 – 6 x 30 minute module tests
Year 11 - 6 x 45 minute written tests
25% coursework

Pathway 2: Year 10 – 6 x 30 minute module tests
25% coursework
Year 11 – 3 x 45 minute written tests
25% coursework

Pathway 3: Year 10 – 6 x 30 minute module tests
25% coursework
Year 11 – 1 x 60 minute written test
60% coursework

Pathway overview

Pathways 1a / 1b :

- 1a. This pathway – the Triple Science ‘Express’ pathway is particularly challenging as it requires pupils to study 3 GCSE subjects (biology, chemistry and physics) in the timetable allocation of two. However, to ease the burden, three Science Study days will be bolted on to the course. Three in Year 10 and three in Year 11. The demanding nature of this pathway makes it accessible to only the most able and committed of our students and will consist of one set of 30 girls.
- 1b. In this pathway we expect girls to achieved a secure level 6 in Science in their assessments throughout the year, as well as the examination occurring in February. This is a demanding course and requires students to be committed. It is important to remember that girls who take this pathway will be using up one of their options.

Pathways 2 & 3 :

These two pathways result in the girls achieving a Double Award qualification. The Year 10 course is exactly the same in both pathways. However, in Year 11, Pathway 2 girls complete ‘Additional Science’ and Pathway 3 girls complete Applied Science.

Applied Science includes much more coursework (60%) and suits girls who enjoy investigative practical work and only involves one examination in the summer term of Y11.

The assessment of Additional Science is more traditional with less emphasis on coursework. There will be three examinations for Additional Science in January & June of Y11.

It is important to note that Pathway 2 provides a perfectly acceptable foundation for ‘A’ level Sciences, whereas Pathway 3 will only be acceptable as a foundation to a vocational science qualification at ‘A’ level.

* Higher Tier: grade range A* - D

* Foundation Tier: grade range C - G

CITIZENSHIP, PERSONAL, SOCIAL & HEALTH EDUCATION

Syllabus:

1. National Curriculum themes of Citizenship and PSHE
2. Full Course GCSE Citizenship

Aim

To succeed in the world of today, individuals need to develop a range of personal, social, academic and vocational skills. The Citizenship and PSHE Programme encourages you to identify such skills thus increasing your level of personal confidence, social competence and self-esteem.

“These are enjoyable sessions, incredibly useful and valuable preparation for everyday life in a sometimes complex world.”

Content

You will be guided through a range of activities linked to the National Curriculum themes and also be given the opportunity to listen to invited speakers on health, careers and the law. Emphasis is placed on the planning and preparation for Work Experience, which involves a two-week work placement during the summer term of Year 10.

“Work experience was fun and a great taster of the adult world of work.”

Assessment

You will be assessed throughout KS4 using the end of Key Stage statements for PSHE and the National Curriculum levels for Citizenship. In addition you will complete the Full Course GCSE Citizenship qualification. This consists of two 1 hour written exams accounting for 40% of the marks and two pieces of coursework, accounting for 60% of the marks. Most coursework will be completed during lesson time.

Homework

You will be expected to complete work which will contribute to your GCSE course.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Syllabus: AQA Entry Level Certificate in Physical Education

Aim

You will be given the opportunity to plan, perform and evaluate as well as improve your knowledge, skills and understanding of a range of physical activities.

Content

You will choose your own programme of activities to take you through Year 10 and 11. Health Related Exercise must be included and at least two activities studied in depth. Choices include games activities (invasion, net/wall and striking), dance, athletics and swimming.

Assessment

Assessment is 100% coursework. You will receive a level 1, 2 or 3 (highest) at the end of the Key Stage.

Your practical performance will be assessed as well as your understanding of rules / regulations and your ability to evaluate and improve performance and undertake an exercise training programme.

“Core PE is very enjoyable for many reasons. The teaching environment is much more adult, the atmosphere is relaxed and you get to choose which activity you want to take part in. There is a much larger range of activities to choose from, so you could try something completely new.”

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Syllabus: OCR Syllabus A (World Religions) Short Course (leads to Half-GCSE)

Aim

You will build upon the foundations laid down at KS3. You will have the opportunity to develop your knowledge, skills and understanding of religion through exploration of the significance and impact of beliefs, teachings, sources, practices, ways of life and forms of expressing meaning. You will also learn how to express personal responses and give informed insights on fundamental questions and issues about identity, belonging, purpose, truth, values and commitments.

“It’s a really good opportunity to study a wide range of different ideas and cultures. Some of the philosophical topics are really invigorating.”

Content

You will study two units for the GCSE Short Course. All pupils will study either Judaism **OR** Sikhism.

Assessment

You will be expected to sit two written papers, each lasting one hour. There is no coursework.

- One assessment ‘Beliefs, Special Days, Divisions and Interpretations’ (50%) will be sat at the end of year 10
- One assessment ‘Worship, Community, and Family, Sacred Writings’ (50%) will be sat at the end of year 11
- You can re-sit each unit once

Homework

You will be expected to complete regular homework tasks, including exam questions, research tasks and creative work.

ART & DESIGN

Syllabus: AQA GCSE

Aim

To develop your skills within Art and Design, visit galleries and research the work of artists and designers and produce a body of work which conveys your responses to the world around you.

Content

This is a broad course exploring practical and critical/contextual work through a range of 2D and/or 3D processes and new media and technologies. It is an unendorsed course where candidates can work in appropriate art, craft and design materials and processes. Candidates should produce practical and contextual work associated with two or more of the endorsed areas of study.

- Fine Art
- Graphic Communication
- Textile Design
- Three-Dimensional Design
- Photography: lens based and light based media

Coursework will be presented as a PORTFOLIO or FOLDER of work which includes the sketchbook used throughout Years 10 and 11.

Assessment

Exam Setting

AQA will set an exam containing a selection of starting points. Exam papers will be issued to candidates from 1st January in the year of the examination.

Taking the exam

There is unlimited preparation time followed by a ten hour period of sustained focused study in which candidates are expected to develop their own unaided work informed by their preparatory studies. During the preparatory period, teachers may discuss starting points with candidates and give them guidance on the choice of materials, how to carry out preparatory studies or how to begin research on their chosen starting point.

UNIT 2 Externally Set Task (EXAM)

Candidates should carefully select and present work for assessment which provides evidence of meeting all four assessment objectives. All the work selected for this unit must be submitted at the end of the ten hour period and will be marked as a whole. Work will be marked by the centre and moderated by AQA.

Continued/.....

You will be assessed throughout the course informally by your teacher. There is a 10 hour exam at the end of Year 11 which is assessed alongside your units of coursework by your teacher and by moderation by the Exam Board. You have time in school to prepare for your exam which includes help from your teacher.

Homework

You complete homework each week using your sketchbook. The sketchbook forms part of your portfolio of work.

Trips

There are two trips, one in Year 10 and one in Year 11. In 2008, for example, Year 10 visited Pallant House Gallery to see a surrealist college exhibition.

BUSINESS STUDIES

Syllabus: ICAAE GCSE in Business Studies

Aim

This course aims to develop your understanding of the business world and it helps you prepare for the working environment. You will investigate all aspects of the business world and this course will be of value to you whether or not you are expecting to leave school or go on to Further or Higher Education.

Content

You will be studying business activity in the UK and the world at large. The objectives of business, the concept of enterprise and the alternative forms of business organisations available to entrepreneurs will be examined. The processes a business goes through to successfully meet the needs of consumers and how businesses recruit, train, manage, motivate and control their workforces. Focus will be paid to the methods used by a business to choose a location, produce goods, control stock and to ensure a quality product of service is produced. It also examines the problems inherent with exporting. Students will understand the use and importance of financial information and external constraints that affect business performance. Lastly the area of business ethics is examined.

“Business Studies is great, it teaches us about money and the society we live in. It’s also really enjoyable. We love it!”

The course is very varied and wherever possible effort is made to take you outside the classroom and visit the real world of business. The course is based on active learning, critical thinking and pupil-led investigation.

Assessment

You will investigate a real business and produce a report in Year 11. The final exam consists of structured questions based on a pre-released case study which will test your knowledge on the areas outlined in the content section.

You will be assessed by a combination of exam and controlled assessment (the report)

75% final exam (2 hours)

25% controlled assessment (3 hours + research time)

Homework

Tasks will be varied but all students will be expected to complete one piece of homework per week. Tasks may include written work, reading a newspaper article, researching information on a particular business or watching a business related TV programme.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Aim

To encourage an understanding of the overall needs of young children and the social and environmental influences which affect their development in a contemporary, changing and multi cultural society.

To encourage the understanding of the wide range of factors which affect the decision to have children, and the responsibilities of parenthood.

Content

You will have the opportunity to have access to a wide number of resources which will help to prepare you for a written examination. You will also be expected to complete in depth coursework. It is essential that you have access to a child or children who are at present aged between 0 and 3 years old.

"I love these lessons and have been really inspired by them. I am very proud of the coursework that I have completed".

Assessment

You will be assessed on an examination at the end of the course; this accounts for 40% of the total of the marks. You will also be required to submit three resource tasks which are completed in Year 10. The long individual task is completed in Year 11 and this with the three resource tasks accounts for the remaining 60% of the marks.

"I really enjoy Child Development. I've learnt so much in a short space of time it's one of my favourite lessons".

Homework

You will be expected to complete homework which is set each week on topics covered previously in lesson time or on work related to coursework. The use of ICT is encouraged at all times but in particular with the presentation of coursework.

DANCE

Syllabus: AQA GCSE Dance

Aim

To develop your knowledge and understanding of dance through the components of Choreography, Performance and Appreciation.

Content

The course is practical in its approach and it builds on the dance foundations you have experienced in Years 7, 8 and 9. Any dance experience you may have had out of school is a useful asset but it is not essential. During the course you will be expected to undertake a certain amount of research and written work based on dance styles, techniques and choreographers. You will also be given the opportunity to explore the design and promotional elements of dance. Most of the time you will spend dancing.

Pupils selecting this option will complete the GCSE Performing Arts – specialising in Dance course in year 10 and the GCSE Dance in year 11.

Requirements

You will need a good level of physical fitness, and interest in or enjoyment of dance and the ability to work individually, with a partner and as part of a group. As well as being able to perform confidently you will need to be able to choreograph dances to convey meaning. You will also need to have good analytical and research skills and the ability to write concise essays.

“I am enjoying GCSE Dance because you have lots of fun working with people to create and perform a dance. Since the beginning of term we have done many dances all different styles and I have enjoyed all of them.”

Assessment

The work is assessed through four units:

1. Written examination, externally assessed 20%
2. Set Dance practical examination, externally assessed 20%
3. Performance in a duo/group controlled assessment, internally assessed and moderated 20%
4. Choreography, internally assessed and moderated 40%

Homework

You will be set a piece of homework every week. This may take the form of written work, performance learning or choreography.

DRAMA

Syllabus: – Edexcel Drama

Aim:

- To develop knowledge of theatre, focusing on drama skills and techniques.
- To develop an understanding and response to a variety of play texts.
- To increase self and group awareness and the ability to appreciate and evaluate the work of others.
- To develop skills of creativity, self confidence, concentration, self-discipline and communication.

Content

- The drama course is split into three units:
- In the first unit you will use drama to explore and develop ideas based around a drama text (stimuli).
- In the second unit you will explore and develop a play script, focusing on how the playwright expresses their ideas within their writing.
- In the third unit you will be involved in the performance of a play from an existing script.

Assessment

Unit 1 (30%): This is a six hour exam which will be undertaken in workshop conditions during lesson time. You will also be required to complete a portfolio of 2000 words which captures your practical process, this exam is assessed internally (20% practical / 10% written).

Unit 2 (30%): This is a six hour exam which will be undertaken in workshop conditions during lesson time. You will also be required to complete a portfolio of 2000 words which captures your practical process, this exam is assessed internally (20% practical / 10% written).

Unit 3 (40%): This section of the examination is a practical performance of an existing script. This is externally examined, you will perform the play in front of a small audience and the examiner will be there to mark you. You are marked only on the performance.

Homework

You will be expected to complete mini-portfolios, learn lines and undertake research projects.

FOOD

Syllabus: AQA GCSE

Aim

This is a highly motivating course involving all aspects of food. You will use your knowledge and understanding of food to design and make exciting new products that appeal to various consumers.

Content

In order to complete this course you must complete two units.

Unit 1 (40% of total marks) Assessed by a written 2 hour paper.

This is split into 3 sections

1.1 Materials and components

This is where you learn about a wide range of food and gain an understanding of how they function e.g. how do sauces thicken, what makes shortcrust pastry short etc. You will also learn about nutrition and the nutritional properties of food. We will look at what happens to food during preparation and cooking and the importance of weighing and measuring.

Healthy eating is also a key part.

The way this unit will be taught will be through theory lessons, workshops and practical lessons.

You will also have to show you are competent with a range of practical skills from chopping and slicing of fruit and vegetables, to cake making, pastry making, cooking with meat, fish, eggs as well as paying attention to finish by glazing, piping and garnishing.

1.2 Design and market influences

This is where you will be able to use your knowledge and understanding of the working characteristics of food together with processing techniques in order to design and make a food product.

1.3 Processes and manufacture

In this section you should know and understand that food products are developed and made safe to eat by how products are combined and their processing techniques. For example, looking at additives, hygiene and safety, safe storage of food and food products, large scale manufacture of products and technological developments eg Genetically Modified foods.

Unit 2 (60% of total marks)

This is a piece of coursework which is looking at Design and Making in practice. You will spend 45 hours working on this. The exam board will set a task and you will have to follow the design process in order to complete it. It will involve both writing and practical work.

You will produce a portfolio of work that will contain photographic evidence of your practical work. The use of ICT is actively encouraged.

FRENCH

Syllabus: AQA GCSE

Aims

A GCSE in French is a valuable qualification and a wider range of job opportunities will be open to you if you are competent in at least one modern language. Universities value languages highly, either studied individually or combined with other subjects. If you are contemplating studying Travel and Tourism at a later date, you should seriously consider taking a language to accompany it.

Content

You will build upon the work you have done during Key Stage 3. You will learn more about the topic areas which you have already covered, such as relationships with family and friends, free time and your home and local area. You will also cover new contexts, for example current and future jobs, media, new technologies, social issues and equality and current problems facing the planet, as well as continuing to learn about the customs and way of life of the country. You will also have the opportunity to visit France and will take part in regular conversations with the French Assistant.

Assessment

You will be examined at the end of Year 11 in listening and reading, either at Higher or Foundation level. You will also complete two controlled speaking assessments and two controlled written assessments.

Homework

You will be expected to complete two homework tasks per week ranging from vocabulary and grammar learning to reading comprehensions and written assignments.

Why Learn French?

French is the native language of some 200 million people worldwide and is the second language of millions more. In the Americas, it is an official language of Canada and it is spoken in the Caribbean. It is also spoken in South-East Asia, North America, Western and Central Africa.

French is the language of business, technology and medicine. French fashion designers, artists, musicians, chefs and film makers have influence throughout the world.

Homework

You will have access to resources online such as power points, past papers, discussion forums and audio and video revision to help with your homework and coursework tasks.

GERMAN

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Aim

A GCSE in German is a valuable qualification and a wider range of job opportunities will be open to you if you are competent in at least one modern language. Universities tend to value languages highly and if you are contemplating studying Travel and Tourism at a later date, you should seriously consider taking a language to accompany it.

Content

You will build upon the work you have done during Key Stage 3. You will learn more about the topic areas which you have already covered, such as family and friends, free time and entertainment and your home. You will also cover new topic areas, for example careers and future plans, as well as continuing to learn about the customs and way of life of the country. You will also have the opportunity to visit Germany and will take part in conversations with native German speakers.

Assessment

You will be examined at the end of Year 11 in listening and reading, either at Higher or Foundation level. You will also complete two controlled speaking assessments and two controlled written assessments.

Homework

You will be expected to complete two homework tasks per week ranging from vocabulary and grammar learning to reading comprehensions and written assignments.

Why Learn German?

German is the native language of over 100 million people in Germany, Austria, Switzerland and other countries. German is the third most studied foreign language in the world – only English and Japanese have more students worldwide.

German is used increasingly as a second language, because of its significance as a language of business, science and technology. Scientists from Germany, Austria and Switzerland have won 21 Nobel Peace Prizes in Physics, 30 in Chemistry, and 25 in Medicine, while many other Nobel Prize winners were educated at German universities. Students in many fields of learning find a knowledge of German not only useful but essential.

Tourism will soon be the largest industry in the world, and Germans are the most widely travelled tourists!

GRAPHIC PRODUCTS

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Aim

This course will encourage you to develop fully your Design and ICT capability through a variety of graphics based activities, involving a wide range of problems, graphics materials and processes. A must for those intending to follow a career in design and advertising.

Content

You will cover the specification of this course through a number of minor projects in a new purpose built room. You may be designing and making some or all of the following plus products of your own choice.

- Ipad design and packaging
- Mobile phone
- DVD case and packaging
- Pop up book
- Perfume box and poster

ICT will play an important part in your design (CAD) and production (CAM) of your work. The type of software used will include Pro Desktop, 2D Design and Corel Draw. You will be using the latest Technology including, Laser Cutters, Digital Cameras, Scanners and other Computer Aided Manufacturing processes. You will have to produce a major project of your choice.

HISTORY

Syllabus: Edexcel History B (Schools History Project)

Aim

To provide you with an enjoyable and challenging History course that gives a good understanding of the development of modern Britain: skills that provide you with a solid basis for further 'A' Level study.

Content

You will be studying topics in four units:

- Unit 1A: Medicine and treatment
- Unit 2A: The transformation of British Society 1815 - 1851
- Unit 3A: The transformation of surgery c1848 - 1918
- Unit 4A: Representations of history CA8 Crime, policing and punishment in England 1880 - 1990

Assessment

For units 1, 2 and 3 you will take an examination in either January or June and unit 4 is a controlled assessment and you will research a task and then write it up in the classroom.

Homework

You will be expected to complete one hour of homework a week and it will include similar activities to those carried out in class but also additional research.

INFORMATION & COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY

Syllabus: OCR National Diploma in ICT

Aim

To provide an enjoyable way to learn new ICT skills in a course that is both challenging and relevant to how you use ICT. Most students will obtain at least a Level 2 National Award (equivalent to 2 GCSEs grades A* - C). Some may be able to go on to obtain the Level 2 National First Certificate (equivalent to 3 GCSEs grades A* - C).

As part of the course you will learn the ICT skills often asked for by employers and needed throughout life. The course provides a good foundation to go on and study 'A' level ICT.

Content

The course is made up of a number of projects, which you will be expected to complete in lessons as well as for homework. In the first topic, you will cover the major components of Microsoft Office in the 'Skills for Business' topic in the form of a small company or student society club.

Other possible projects include:

- Web site design
- Video creation and editing
- Image creation, animation and photo editing
- Desktop publishing
- Spreadsheets
- Design and production of multimedia products
- E-commerce

Assessment

100% Coursework

Homework

You will be expected to work on your projects at home for around 1 hour per week.

LATIN

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Aim

You will progress to reading 'real' Latin, whilst learning more about the Romans. You will develop your mental agility, your logical reasoning and your memory. You will also learn a great deal about English and it will assist you with other languages.

You will find this a stimulating and enjoyable subject, and you will obtain a highly regarded qualification, not available to all state school pupils. Universities tend to value Latin highly.

Content

You will complete the Cambridge Latin Course and gradually progress to reading extracts of real Latin. By the end of Year 10 you will have met all the grammar which you need to know. You will therefore have plenty of time to become really familiar with it. There is a set vocabulary list, and you will find that you know many of the words already.

Before the end of Year 10 you will start work on set texts (passages from the works of Roman writers). We read these together in lessons and prepare them thoroughly so that examination questions can be tackled with confidence. Some of these passages will tell you about aspects of life in Roman times, others come from famous myths.

Assessment

You will sit examination papers, which contain questions in English on set text passages and passages in Latin for translation and comprehension. There are no grammar questions and you will not have to do coursework.

Homework

You will be expected to do two short homeworks each week, similar in length and type to your current homework.

LEISURE & TOURISM

Syllabus: Edexcel GCSE in Leisure and Tourism (2LT01)

Aim

This course aims to enable you to investigate the Leisure & Tourism industry which may act as a first step for those students who may wish to pursue a career in one of the many interesting areas in the industry. Job opportunities will be in areas such as sport and recreation, hotel management, entertainment, travel and tourism. You will have the opportunity to apply learning in a practical, realistic way and follow a programme of study that enables progression to further courses in Further and Higher Education and employment in leisure or tourism.

You will develop Key Skills, such as ICT, which are highly valued by employers and further education and gain confidence by developing independent learning skills. Outside speakers and visits to businesses in the leisure industry will be incorporated where appropriate.

Content

The course aims to give you the opportunity to understand the nature of the Leisure & Tourism industry and the contribution that Leisure & Tourism makes to society and the economy. You will study the types of organisations that operate in Leisure & Tourism, the factors influencing how we choose what to do in our leisure time. It will also introduce you to tourism destinations, their impact and sustainability. You will also study visitor attractions, leisure facilities and tourist destinations, look at how organisations in the industry provide services for different types of customers and lastly to understand the employment opportunities available in Leisure & Tourism.

Assessment

You will be assessed by a combination of exam and controlled assessment:

Unit 1: The Leisure & Tourism Industry (40% of the total GCSE) 1 hour externally assessed examination paper. The paper will consist of multiple-choice, short-answer and extended-writing style questions covering all the unit topics.

Unit 4: Customers and Employment in Leisure & Tourism (60% of the total GCSE) is a controlled assessment task covering the unit content and provided by Edexcel.

Homework

Tasks will be varied, but all students will be expected to complete one piece of homework per week. Tasks may include written work, reading a newspaper article, researching information on a particular organisation or watching a Leisure & Tourism related TV programme.

MEDIA STUDIES

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Aim

The aim of this course is to enable you to develop a critical understanding of a range of media texts and the ways in which they are read and understood by different audiences. You will be encouraged to develop an awareness of the debates surrounding the role of the media within society and to understand the links between media institutions, products and their audiences. You will also have the opportunity to acquire practical production skills in a variety of media.

Content

GCSE Media Studies uses four major concepts which form the basis of the subject content.

- Media Language
- Institutions
- Audience
- Representation

Media Forms/Platforms

- Television
- Film
- Video
- Advertising and Marketing
- Popular Music
- News

Assessment

The course is made up of three units :

Unit B321 – The Individual Media Studies Production = 30% of GCSE. This is a Controlled Assessment unit that is internally assessed and externally moderated. You will produce an individual portfolio. The topics you will work on will be Advertising and Television Soaps;

Unit B323 – Textual Analysis and Media Studies Topics (Moving Image) = 40% GCSE. This is an examinable unit where you, in Section A, will analyse and respond to a short, unseen, moving image. In Section B you will answer questions based on Audience and Institutions through studying Television Comedy;

Unit B324 – Production Portfolio in Media Studies = 30% of GCSE. This is a Controlled Assessment unit that is internally assessed and externally moderated. You will produce a major practical production. The topic will be Popular Music.

Homework

You will be expected to complete regular homeworks that assist with coursework completion and preparation for the exam.

MUSIC

Syllabus: EDEXCEL GCSE

Aim

GCSE Music is a very practical subject which builds on performance standards achieved both in and out of the classroom. In the course you will learn how to compose and develop skills in performing and appraising music.

Content

You will study

- Structure in Western Classical Music 1600-1899 (ground bass and variations, ternary form, rondo)
- Changing directions in Western Classical music from 1900 (expressionism, experimental and electronic music)
- Popular music in context (dance music 1985 – present day, songs from musicals, Britpop and its influences)
- Indian raga, African music and fusions.

Assessment

Coursework

Performing (30%) / composing (30%)

Exam

Listening written paper (40%)

Performing - pupils are required to perform two pieces of music and one of the pieces must be together with at least one other person or a larger group.

Composing - Pupils are required to compose two pieces of music, based on two areas of study.

Listening paper – questions are based on the four areas of study.

The performing 30% of the course is taken care of if you can already play an instrument or sing to a reasonable standard. A musical and accurate performance of even a grade 2 standard piece could access you full marks for performing. You do not have to even be this standard, but must be able to perform on an instrument or sing.

Homework

You will be expected to practise regularly and to work at composition projects. You should also take part in as much extra curricular music as possible.

PERFORMING ARTS – SPECIALISING IN DANCE

GCSE

Syllabus: AQA

Aim

To develop your knowledge and understanding of different dance styles and the contribution they make to the performing arts.

Content

The course is practical in its approach and it covers a wide range of dance styles. Any dance experience you may have had out of school is a useful asset but not essential. During the course you will be expected to undertake research and written work based on the dance styles for your portfolio as well as planning and evaluative work showing your understanding of your progress.

Requirements

You will need to have a good level of physical fitness and should have achieved a good standard of performance in dance at Key Stage 3. An interest in a wide range of dance styles and an ability to work collaboratively are essential. A creative flair and an eye for design are valuable assets.

Assessment

The single award incorporates two units:

Unit 1 (worth 60% of the total mark) consisting of portfolio evidence based on your skill, development, knowledge and understanding, internally assessed and moderated;

Unit 2 (worth 40% of the total mark) your showcase performance in response to the commission set by the examination board, externally assessed.

Homework

You will be set a piece of homework every week. This may take the form of written work or performance learning.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Syllabus: AQA GCSE

Aim

To develop your skills with Photography, to visit galleries and research the work of photographers and artists who use photography in their work and use this as inspiration for your own photography. Also to produce a body of work which conveys your responses to the world around you.

Content

You will produce a portfolio of work which will consist of two or three themed projects, with each project based on a different theme. You will learn how to develop your digital photography skills and extend your ideas of what makes a good photo. You can submit digital photographs you have taken both in and outside school. In Autumn 2009 we ran small workshops where students made PHOTOGRAMS and worked on a fashion themed project with photographer, Maria Riese.

Assessment

You will be assessed throughout the course informally by your teacher. There is a ten hour externally set submission at the end of Year 11, which is assessed alongside your portfolio of coursework by your teacher and by moderation by the Exam Board. You have 3 months to prepare for your exam which includes help from your teacher.

Homework

You complete homework each week. Homework tasks will include research into photographers' work and practical tasks including the taking and presentation of photographs.

Trips

We aim to allow you to visit local places of interest which can inspire your photography. In 2009 Year 10 visited Chichester Cathedral and their photos taken there formed part of their coursework portfolio.

We aim to visit relevant art and photography exhibitions in different locations including Pallant House Gallery, the National Portrait Gallery and the Victoria and Albert Museum.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

We offer 2 courses.

Your PE teacher will advise you on which is more suitable for you.

Course 1 PE GCSE

**Syllabus: AQA GCSE
Physical Education**

Aim

To enable you to enjoy and understand the benefits of living a healthy and active lifestyle. To provide a route to further study in Further Education awards such as A levels and/or the new Diplomas, and to Higher Education in PE as well as to related career opportunities.

Content

Theory: You will learn about health and fitness, training, diet, school influences, emotional health and well being, family, media and sponsorship influences as well as international factors etc.

Practical: 4 assessments

- From at least 2 groups
- At least 2 performances must be as player/performer
- At least one must be in a different role (official, captain etc.)

Assessment

1. Knowledge and understanding for the active participant 80 marks
External assessment – 40% of the award Written paper 1½ hours

Section A – Objective (multiple choice) tests and short answer questions.

Section B – Extended written answers, based on scenario issued as Pre-release Material prior to the examination.

2. The Active Participant 90 marks
Practical assessment – 60% of the award

Practical activity groups include:

- Games activities (basketball, netball, rounders, hockey, tennis, etc.)
- Gymnastics activities (gymnastics, trampolining, cheerleading, etc.)
- Dance activities (modern educational dance, street dance, etc.)
- Athletic activities (athletics, cross country, competitive swimming, golf, etc.)
- OAA activities (life saving, personal survival, sailing, etc.)
- Health and fitness activities (aerobics, yoga, circuit training, etc.)

Homework

Homework will be based on the theory or practical sessions.

PTO

OR

Course 2 **PE BTEC**

**This course leads to the equivalent to 2 GCSE grades.
It will suit you if you prefer a more practical approach, with less theory and no final exam.**

Syllabus: Edexcel Level 2 BTEC First Certificate in Sport

Aim

You will develop a range of skills, techniques, understanding of physical qualities and attitudes essential for success in working life. Specialist studies directly relating to sport and leisure will provide a stepping stone into employment in this area.

Content

Your study will involve work from four units:

1. Fitness testing & Training
2. Practical Sport

Plus two more (units to be confirmed)

Assessment

All units are internally assessed and take the form of both practical and theoretical coursework. Your work is continually assessed with the opportunity to improve aspects if required. As there is no final exam, a large amount of written coursework is required.

Homework

You will be expected to complete homework arising from various aspects of the course.

If all work is completed to a satisfactory standard you will achieve 2 GCSE equivalent grades for this subject.

PRODUCT DESIGN

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Pass Rate A-C 92% +

Aim

This course will encourage you to fully develop your Design capability. We aim to build upon your current skills and knowledge in order to design and make products. We aim to raise your ICT skills and confidence to a very high standard.

This is the fourth year of running this course and the feedback has been very positive. We are recognised by the exam board as one of the best schools for OCR Product Design in the south. ***Our students work is used as exemplar material across the country and in a new book just published.***

Content

This is a mainly practical course. Initially in Year 10, you will complete teacher-led projects raising your ability in manufacturing products using a variety of materials. Typical teacher led projects will include jewellery, electronic toys and Solar projects.

You will have the opportunity to use some of the latest equipment in design and manufacturing, including a laser cutter, injection moulder, and a number of powerful CAD/CAM software.

As part of your final assessment you will be required to design and produce a product of your choice. For example:

- Manufacture a new range of jewellery
- Children's Toys
- MP3 docking station

Assessment

The assessment is divided into 4 units, which are tireless. This means all students can access the higher grades.

30% Coursework Design Portfolio

30% Coursework Practical Task

20% Technology Challenge (practical task over 6 hours)

20% Examination

Note: Students can re-sit or resubmit any unit twice to enable them to achieve the best possible grades.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

Philosophy & Applied Ethics

Syllabus: OCR GCSE J121

Aim

To learn about:

- The approaches of Religion and Philosophy to some of the most fundamental questions about human existence
- The approaches of Religion and Ethics to some of the most important questions about how people behave and why

“A more open minded look at life, religion and morals. Fun and interesting debating”.

Content

This course will allow you to gain a qualification in a subject you have been studying most of your school life and let you build on the foundations this study has provided. This subject is an excellent basis for moving onto AS or Advanced GCE in the Philosophy and Ethics area of RS.

You will discover how the beliefs of religions affect the ways in which believers make decisions about moral issues and lead their lives. You will study eight topics including: Deity, Religious & Spiritual Experience, End of Life, Good & Evil, Revelation Science & Religion, Relationships, Medical Ethics, Poverty & Wealth, Peace & Justice, Equality, Religion & Media.

“RS helps you with all other subjects as it teaches you how to think and ask questions.”

You should be the kind of pupil who enjoys discussions; who enjoys written work and who is willing to consider the ideas and beliefs of others. You will be excited about trying to answer some difficult questions – Is there a God? What is right and wrong? Why do people have different beliefs?

According to the philosopher A J Ayer, the business of philosophy is to clarify and analyse. If anything, philosophy seems to make things more complex and confusing, and produce problems where none appeared before! Are you ready to begin solving these problems?

Assessment

- At the end of Year 10 you will sit two exam papers: Philosophy 1 (1 Hour 25%), Ethics 1. (1 Hour 25%)
- At the end of Year 11 you will sit two exam papers: Philosophy 2 (1 Hour 25%), Ethics 2 (1 Hour 25%)
- All exam questions will be divided into five parts. Each part will give you the chance to demonstrate a different skill.
- You may re-sit each unit once

Homework

You will be expected to complete regular weekly homework assignments, including essay questions. You will be expected to regularly use Moodle as a research & support tool & encouraged to contribute to the GCSE forums.

SOCIOLOGY

Syllabus: OCR GCSE

Aim

To investigate and understand Britain today. A well-known Sociologist, Anthony Giddens describes this subject as “The study of human social life. It is a dazzling and compelling enterprise”.

Content

You will study:

Unit B671: What is Sociology?

Unit B672: Socialisation, Culture and Identity: The Family, Education and Crime and Deviance

Unit B673: Applying Sociological Research Techniques

You will bring with you a range of skills such as language; working with numbers and diagrams; knowledge of our past; the experience of being a school pupil and a member of a family in the Britain of the 21st Century.

You will be the kind of pupil who enjoys discussions; who is interested in what is happening now; who enjoys written work; who wants to learn about all the different issues which for example explain why today there are rich and poor and different classes and ethnic groups in Britain today.

This is a subject which will cater for your individual needs. If you intend leaving school at the end of Year 11 then you will have gained an important understanding of the adult world you are joining. If you intend continuing with your education Sociology can be studied at A-level in our Sixth Form and beyond at University. This is a tiered paper subject – all abilities are catered for.

Assessment

You will sit an exam on each unit. Entry will in January or June when you have completed a unit.

Homework

You will be expected to complete regular weekly homework assignments.

TEXTILES

ART & DESIGN

Syllabus: AQA GCSE

Aim

This course aims to develop your creative and imaginative powers through following a GCSE course that is intellectually stimulating and challenging. It offers the chance to express your ideas, feelings and meanings through visual and tactile forms.

Content

You will produce a portfolio of work which reflects your own experience and personal engagement within the learning opportunities provided.

You will research, investigate and record observations using a range of textile media, techniques and processes including both traditional and new technologies. You will explore a range of dye and paint techniques including silk painting, batik and tie-dye.

You will experience a varied range of stitched and constructed textile technique including appliqué, quilting, hand and machine embroidery, felting, fabric manipulation and 3D construction.

You will gain knowledge and understanding of other artists, designers and craftspeople. You will use ICT to present your work to professional standards.

As a textiles student you will have the opportunity to use the textile facilities during lunch times and after school. Attend extra curricular workshops on specialist textile techniques. Assist with costume design and manufacture for school productions.

A qualification in Textiles can lead to numerous career opportunities in the Fashion, Retail and Textile Industries.

Assessment

You will be assessed by a combination of coursework and a portfolio of an externally set task of 10 hours duration.

60% Coursework - portfolio

40% Externally set task

Homework

You will be expected to complete various tasks related to your units of study. You will be required to provide an A1 Art and Design portfolio to present your evidence of portfolio coursework. You will be asked to contribute to the cost of your own materials.

Visits

You will visit Fashion Shows, Exhibitions, Museums and Galleries to enrich your areas of research and study.

THE DIPLOMA

The Diploma is a new qualification that can be studied alongside GCSEs. It gives pupils the opportunity to learn in a creative way, combining classwork with hands-on experience. The Diploma can be studied at Foundation or Higher Level in Key Stage 4. Pupils who choose to study for a Diploma will cover core subjects including functional skills in English, Maths and ICT and other skills employers value like teamwork and problem-solving, along with subjects that relate to work. Please see the following table:-
